





NOMAD KAYAK CLUB – PADDLING POLICY

The Club arranges its insurance through British Canoeing. The insurance only provides cover for Club Activity which is defined by British Canoeing as:

"Any activity that has been assessed as part of the Club's safety framework and promoted on the Club calendar, website or noticeboard. Club Activities also include inter-club activities where the responsibility for risk assessment and management is carried out and then shared between all participating clubs."

The Club Committee have defined the following occasions to be Club Activity.

The Committee has a duty of care to ensure that any Club led activity takes place within a safety framework that incorporates appropriate risk management. This includes the assessment of the competence of those permitted to lead sessions regardless of whether coaches and leaders have British Canoeing qualifications.

As a minimum, session leaders will have the following training:

- First Aid Training
- FSRT (Foundation Safety & Rescue Training)
- Safeguarding Training
- NKC Site Specific Training

Authorised Canoe Polo Leaders, Recreational Leaders, Trip Leaders and Pool Leaders will be assessed as to the remit within which they can operate.

What needs to be assessed: Personal skills and paddling ability, Rescue of self and others, Leadership of groups and individuals, Experience of operating in different environments and conditions, Knowledge of environment, participants, equipment etc.

How is competence evaluated? A test or assessment, Self-evaluation, References from experienced competent persons, Frequent and regular observations of the other coaches/leaders, Previous experience.

Full details of the process will be documented in the Operating Procedure for Coaches and Leaders.







Home waters

For home waters, using the 'BCAB Environmental Definitions and Deployment Guidance for Instructors, Coaches and Leaders' as guidance, the following ratios will be adopted at NKC for coaching and leadership of Club sessions. All coaches/leaders & peer groups are to paddle in accordance with the Club Health & Safety Policy and Club Risk Assessments.

- (1) Paddlesport Instructors must have First Aid training, Safeguarding and NKC site specific training
- (2) As assessed & approved by the committee in accordance with the Operating Procedures for Coaches and Leaders
- (3) Or be assessed as having equivalent experience. Note: the BCU 2 star award covers both canoe & kayak. It is recognised that paddlers may achieve the required standard in one discipline prior to gaining the award.
- (4) This ratio may be exceeded on condition that the coach is assisted by at least one other experienced paddler.

Youth Paddlers

Members of the Club who are under 16 must paddle with a Club coach or their parent/guardian.

Paddlers 16 or over and under 18 may be permitted to paddle on home waters as part of a leader led/peer group i.e. not under the supervision of a coach but must hold the Paddle Explore Award (formerly 2 star) or be assessed as having equivalent experience. Their parents / guardians must understand and accept the assumed risks associated with this policy and give their permission for the young person to paddle without a coach present.







Trips

For Paddling away from home waters the following will be used as the basis of assessment for remit of Trip Leaders.

The definition implies weather conditions that are not in themselves likely to cause problems. At any point, the paddler should not be more than 50 metres from the bank. Moderate water Coach/Leader to participant ratio 1:6	Inland: Large areas of open water that exceed the sheltered water definition, where the paddlers are no more than 500 metres offshore and in wind strengths that do not exceed Beaufort force 4. White Water: Grade 2(3) white water or equivalent weirs. Sea: A stretch of coastline with some areas where it is not easy to land but there will always be straightforward land points a maximum of two nautical miles apart. Crossings not exceeding two nautical miles. Up to 2 Knots of tide (but not involving tide race or overfalls). Wind strengths do not exceed Beaufort force 4. Launching and landing through surf (up to 1 metre, trough to crest height). Surf: Sections of sandy beaches free from significant hazard (e.g. rocks and strong rips) and easy access. Gentle, sloping and spilling waves, preferably peeling. Not pitching or dumping. Wave height should be no more than double overhead when seated in a kayak in the trough of the wave (head high for a stand up surfer). Surf: Reefs, points, offshore breaks and sandy beaches, which may have significant hazards (e.g. rocks, strong rips, etc.) and may be remote and/or have difficult access. Waves may be powerful, steep, pitching, fast, hollow and heavy. Up to and above double overhead when seated in a kayak in the trough of the wave (or head high and above for a stand up surfer). RIVER GRADES

Extract from British Canoeing Environmental Definitions and Deployment Guidance for Instructors, Coaches and Leaders November 2021

Ungraded	Ungraded sections of slow moving rivers where the group could paddle upstream against the flow (not involving the shooting of, or playing on,
	weirs or running rapids).
Grade 1	Moving water with occasional small rapids. Few or no obstacles to negotiate.
Grade 2	Small rapids featuring regular waves. Some manoeuvring required.
Grade 2(3)	The overall standard of the run is grade 2, but there may be a few (normally one or two) grade 3 rapids that can be portaged if required.
Grade 3	Most rapids will have irregular waves and hazards that need avoiding. More difficult manoeuvring will be required but routes are normally
	obvious. Scouting from shore is occasionally necessary to maintain line of sight.
Grade 4	Large rapids that require careful manoeuvring. Scouting from the shore is often necessary and rescue is usually difficult. Kayakers should be
	able to roll before tackling these rapids. In the event of a mishap, there is significant risk of loss, damage and/or injury.
Grade 4(5)	The overall standard of the run is grade 4, but there may be a few (normally one or two) grade 5 rapids that can be portaged if required.
Grade 5	Extremely difficult – long and very violent rapids with severe hazards. Continuous, powerful, confused water makes route finding difficult and
	scouting from the shore is essential. Precise manoeuvring is critical and for kayakers, rolling ability needs to be 100%. Rescue is very difficult
	or impossible and, in the event of a mishap, there is significant hazard to life.
